

Summer Forage Tour 1996 Update

Our Association has successfully contacted Myron Bjorge, the Provincial Forage Specialist for Alberta and he has agreed to line up tour stops and to host our Peace Country B.C. Forage Bus participants. Tentative plans include two full days 8:00 am til 8:00pm in the Rocky Mountain House area of Alberta.

Tour stops are likely to include:

** intensive grazing management and pasture rotation of dairy cattle ** intensive grazing management and pasture rotation of beef cattle ** silage making ** visit to a farmer selling compacted Timothy bales on export market ** haying management ** a background (weaned calf to short yearling) beef feedlot ** barbeque and visiting and ruminating with local Alberta graziers and livestock producers. ** pleasant bus trip from Dawson Creek and return, est. 8 hours each way ** visit to farms and ranches practicing extending the grazing season in late fall and early spring.

Confirmed dates: June 24 & 25, 1996

By this time, grazing operators will be well into their programs and some regrowth will be evident on previously grazed areas. Myron is very flexible on the program content and is pleased to assist our group of B.C. Forage enthusiasts. This is an excellent opportunity to increase your forage knowledge as a B.C. Peace Country livestock producer, so don't miss out.

Cost and Payment A charter bus from Dawson Creek to Rocky Mountain House and return for three days and three nights is approximately \$2,000. Two nights lodging, meals and miscellaneous expenses are on top of this figure for each participant. Cost per participant is based on total cost coverage, therefore is budgeted to be \$150.00 each plus meals. Down payment on tour registration fee by Februar(1, 1996 of \$50.00 per tour participant.

Geography

The area south of the Yellowhead and down into the Rimby and Rocky Mountain House area has a similiar climate and soils to the Peace River Country; and, hence graziers and livestock producers down there often face similar production and and management conditions to us. "Weaver and Pedersen to lead Association in 1996"

Our December first Annual Meeting in Taylor drew a good owd of forage enthusiasts, actually a few more than last year.

As reported by Treasurer Glenn Hogberg and Secretary Ernest Nimitz your Association had an active year and at yearend was in a sound financial position with a modest amount of money in the bank to pursue 1996 forage activities.

1995 activities of your Association included: Three issues of our Newsletter "Forage First" (December, May, October); participation in Forage Variety Trails at four sites in B.C. Peace (May to September), a successful summer tour in Ground Birch-Progress area (June), hosting of 1995 BCFC AGM Trade Fair - Seminar (January); sponsoring a Low Stress Animal Handling Seminar (October); an Association Fund Raiser (August).

Major Committees which will function for 1996 are: Winter Seminar -Contact Ernie Fuhr and Tom Pittman. Summer Tour - Contact Ernest Nimitz and Bob Tubb Wildlife Policy - Contact Keith Weaver R & D - Contact Glen Hogberg and Jim Forbes

In his report to the meeting President Keith Weaver pointed that a lot of our members and their neighbours are ing exposed to extensive use of their winter hay supplies by elk, moose, and deer this winter. As a result of the discussion it was decided to create a committee to study and deal with this problem.

The Research and Development Committee's main thrust this year will be the forage varietal and cultivar trials. This will be the third year of our association involvement in these plots located at Jim Collins Farm and Grandview Farms in the North Peace and Tyne Cara Farms and Odden Ranch in the South Peace. A major objective of this committee is to explore the possibilities of funding our Forage Technician beyond 4 months, possibly up to 12, to work on other Association projects such as Farm Forage Facts and our various association activities throughout the year.

Another significant idea of our president is starting to bear fruit. Winter Forage Club Meetings. The objective of these is to move around our big area with about 4 to 6 meetings each winter in different farming communities so that our members have a better opportunity to participate in the Association. These are informal, but present an opportunity to trade useful forage and other agricultural information between farmers and ranchers. Each meeting is hosted by a different family.

New directors elected were: Horst David of Tomslake and Don Pedersen of Dawson Creek. Keith Weaver of Tomslake was reelected a director. Harvey Wiles of Baldonnel and Burnem Grant of Tomslake were appointed auditors for 1996.

Our guest speaker, **Pete Schuler** from the Quesnel area, briefed us on the hay hauling business and then spent over half and hour replying to questions and concerns of those present.

Depending on whose figures you use, as much as 150,000 tons of hay will move into the Cariboo Area before the end of this winter.

Since a significant part of this will come the Peace this is a nice economic opportunity for those who have the hay here to sell.

Prices FOB the Cariboo range from \$90 to \$120. This comes out to \$40 - \$50/ton for farmers here in the Peace.

Apparently this hay deficite in the Cariboo area of 100,000 tons more of less is a permanent fixture; hence, hay producers in the Peace can look at an approximate export annually of 50,000 tons in that direction.

In a brief directors meeting following the AGM Keith Weaver was reelected as President of the Association. Don Pedersen was elected as Vice President. Glenn Hogberg and Ernest Nimitz were re-elected as Treasurer and Secretary, respectively.

Low Initial Rate of Digestion (LIRD)

This describes new cultivars of reduced or non-bloating alfalfas which are likely to be released as a variety(s) in winter 1997. Field testing is well underway at three Western Canada locations, one of which is Kamloops.

LIRD type alfalfas have a different cell structure and hence when eaten **do not** digest quickly and froth up in the digestive tract and then progress rapidly into a bloated condition in the animal. This is an important development on the horizon (and getting rapidly closer) for those graziers who want to achieve the superior animal weight gains associated with the grazing agumes.

Breeder Seed of LIRD cultivars was planted in 1995. For further information on this important topic please contact: Dr. Bruce Coulman, Ag Canada Research station, Saskatoon (306) 956-7200. We anticipate including seed of LIRD cultivars in our varietal cultivar forage trials in the Peace in 1996.
