The guest speakers addressed themselves to and described the successes of several of the Forage Association research and demonstrations projects.

Treasurer **Bill Wilson** reported a healthy financial situation for the Association which will allow us to continue the existing projects plus expand their scope, as well as beginning the implementation of several new projects in 2002.

The Secretary reported a healthy membership situation with 130 paid up members at the end of the 2001 year. As well, he reported on these successes. Several Directors meetings throughout the year. Several Winter Forage Club meetings last winter. A hugely attended Summer Forage Tour in the Groundbirch, Lone Prairie and Chetwynd area. Pasture Management in the Peace 2002

The annual pasture school at Lacombe in June each year hosted and organized by the Western Forage Beef Group has a well deserved excellent reputation for delivering properly balanced information on both the practical and technical aspects of pasture and livestock management.

This is a limited entry event so that a lot of "hands on" and 'one on one" can occur between participants and presenters.

The three days and two nights of intensive activity have been likened to cramming the key parts of three years university education and three years good work experience in range, pasture and livestock management into about 75 hours! However, nothing but good reports have emanated from those who have attended, even though all describe the sessions as "definitely intensive in nature"!

Realizing that this type of adult extension education can prove both culturally and economically valuable to livestock producers and other forage enthusiasts in the B.C. Peace River Country, your local Forage Association has decided to bring a mini pasture school to our area in 2002

This opportunity for local ranchers and farmers will be presented in four modules, featuring many of the leading edge scientists, extension staff and forage producers who are involved in the annual Lacombe event.

The first module "Why Bother with Pasture or Woodland Management"? Will be presented at Doe River Community Hall on Tuesday January 22, 2002 This session requires an investment of \$15 per adult and is an unlimited entry event.

Association Plans Busy Year of Activities Designed to Benefit Membership

One major activity discussed at length at the AGM in Taylor on December first was the **B.C. Peace River**Country Forage Development Project. This comprehensive planning and action document has been under the process of revision for the past 10 months. To date it has been reorganized, fleshed out and polished up; and, brought up to date for accuracy of the data included. For the annual meeting, the entire contents of this project were hung on the walls of the meeting room with a separate page for each individual component complete with a date line from 1992-2015. Those attending were asked to paste on information of their choosing on the individual projects of their interest.

Initial monies have been allocated and more are currently being sought: to fund the various activities under this project and to fund organization and formatting of this information complete with proper datelines and linkages followed by entry of information onto a selected website. Please be aware that this often takes the use of significant amounts of Corral Language to accomplish! Time goal is within the next six months. There are approximately 22 sections to the BCPRCFDP and 51 projects and subprojects underway and planned. Currently the Association has accumulated a significant amount of useful economic and environmental type forage information in the 10 years since its formation. By making this information readily available to its membership via the internet it is anticipated that the economic benefits can be substantial. The proper use of an association forage website can also assist the directors and staff to a high degree in terms of planning for the next 10 years and monitoring various projects currently underway. The BCPRCFD Project may itsself be likened to the management of a large forest whereas each component or subproject may be likened to the management of individual trees or clumps of trees within the rest.

Specific activities discussed at the AGM that are expected to get a lot of attention in 2002 include Forage First, Winter Forage Club Meetings and Forage Friendly Field Days, Water Demonstration sites, Forage Facts, Intensive Management and Controlled Grazing on Poplar Logged Areas, several projects involving Soil Management and Nutrient Increase in Forage Plants and the Summer Forage Tour/Winter Forage Seminar. (Included together as Mini Pasture School 2002).

Another significant area of Association involvement in 2002 will be assisting the Peace River Regional Cattlemen's Association and the B.C. South Peace Stockmen's Association in planning and organizing the 74th Annual British Columbia Cattlemen's Association AGM-Trade Fair-Convention in Dawson Creek on June 6,7,8th 2002.
