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Walter Fritsche Returns to Board Of Directors

You are not a newcomer to the forage association, but some of our new members may not know you. Tell us about your family farm?

Walter: Roslement Farm includes Pam, Michael and myself. We have another son Walter Jr. who works with Ross Ravelli and helps out here when he can. We initially started with cows, and we used to burn the grass above our house. Then about 23 years ago, we almost lost our farm to fire. After that, sheep were strongly recommended to us as the ideal grass mowing solution.

Tell our readers more about your sheep.

Walter: We started with 8 Dorset/ Romonoff cross ewes. Usually we have about 35 ewes, including Arcott/Dorset and Arcott/Suffolk crosses. In the last 4 years, lamb prices have been good and with a small flock you can manage for a 240% lamb crop. Both the flock and management are aging, so we are at a turning point. We have been cutting back on our numbers and only lambed out 13 this year.

Don't you also grow forage and annual crops?

Walter: Yes, we have over 200 ac in high quality alfalfa grass mixed hay. We put up over 5000 small square bales for the horse owner market. We also sell 300 to 500 of the 4 x 5 smaller round bales for small acre holders. We also farm 350 ac in barley, peas and canola.

What forage crops work the best for you?

Walter: We grow grass-alfalfa mixes for the horse owners. Timothy or bromegrass work well most often, but we do have a field that is protected to the east and west where orchard grass has been good.

What other groups are you active with?

Walter: I was active for many years with the BC Sheep Breeders and was the Peace Region rep on the BC Sheep Federation. For the last 15 years, I have been representing forage interests on the PRAD Advisory Committee.

What special initiative(s) would you like to see the Forage Board get behind?

Walter: I would like us to do a better job of mentoring our younger members, so we don't become a board of senior citizens like me. I would also like to work with the board to avoid some of the wrecks that I witnessed with the BC Sheep Federation. We are now handling more money and larger projects, so I feel we should pursue directors' liability insurance.

What is your favorite part of what you do?

Walter: I love the lamb season and hosting day care and school groups. We enjoy helping Walter Jr. host a multi family, Easter egg hunt and lamb cuddle every year.

Re-vegetating Land Disturbed by Oil & Gas Activities

- Determine forage mixes that will be successful in re-vegetating berms, road sides, and pipelines
- To share results amongst producers, oil and gas industry and government via field days, website and facts sheets
- To communicate out results and work with seed companies, forage seed industry, government, and oil gas industry in the adoption of these mixes where appropriate.

Workplan Includes Investigating:

- Timing of seeding, spring vs fall, for native and agronomic mixes for pipelines, roadways & berms
- Rate of seeding, & compensating for less than ideal situations
- Seed mixes, including appropriate & desirable mixes for both private & crown land
- Vegetation cover for berms targeting low height vegetation with good erosion control practices
- Using noncompetitive cover crops for temporary forage establishment & soil protection.

Progress To Date:

- Spring seeding in 2012 season: 2 Encana lease sites + 1 Encana roadway with research & demo plots at all 3 sites
- ♦ Fall seeding at 2 Shell roadway + lease sites
- Site monitoring for species emergence
- ♦ 10 field tours of the sites

Commitments & Next Steps:

- Establish 10 more sites including roadways, berms & pipelines
- Work on the soil fertility issues associated with re-vegetation
- Continue to monitor emergence & stand establishment
- Continue sharing knowledge via the website, factsheets, articles in newsletters/ magazines & field tours.

Trailing of the Sheep Festival

For nearly a hundred years, flocks of thousands of sheep moved from alpine pastures to lower desert wintering areas in many parts of Idaho. In the 1920s and 1930s millions of sheep were moved through the towns of Ketchum and Hailey by shepherds and sheep dogs.

Transporting sheep to market was the only reason for the railroad in the 1930s, until an Austrian developer created the Sun Valley ski resort at the end of the railway. The sheep industry gradually declined and shifted, while the Sun Valley developed into a popular resort with million dollar homes. Today these two very different cultures mingle once a year every October during the annual Trailing of the Sheep Festival.



The highlight of a weekend of events including fleece judging, fibre fair, lamb feasts, dancing, and special speakers, is the parade on Sunday through Ketchum's Main Street. Basque dance troupe, Peruvian dancers, as well as the Boise Highlander Pipe and Drum band shared their past or current sheep based cultures with colourful energy during the parade. A horse drawn sheep wagon built by Kim and Kathy Vader was the main event for Rick. Sheep wagons are still used in many parts of Idaho and are home for the shepherds for months at a time, as they follow the sheep to graze.

Finally (on sheep time not people time) came 1700 sheep with sheep dogs, shepherds and running teenagers herding them through crowds and the million dollar homes and stores. These sheep had spent the summer on national forest lands above Ketchum and were on their way to winter pastures or market. Sunshine, music, families, lamb BarBQ and an entertaining announcer when the parade drifted to sheep time all made it a fun event for us.

Foraging News

A British Columbia Rangeland Seeding Manual was just published by the BC Ministry of Agriculture with support of the Growing Forward federal-provincial-territorial initiative.

The manual offers guidance to help agriculture producers and resource professionals make seeding decisions in variety of management contexts. The contexts include pasture, forestland grassland restoration. silvo-pasture, grazing, ecosystem restoration, post-wildfire rehabilitation and site rehabilitation. The manual provides detailed descriptions and photographs of over 45 agronomic and native grass and legume species that might be considered for rangeland and pasture seeding in BC. It also includes a species filter tool to help with species selection to support various seeding objectives, as well as information on sourcina methods seed. seedina establishment.

The BC rangeland seeding manual was produced by **Allen Dobb** and **Sandra Burton**, using information from BC and Alberta research, and input from seed industry and forage seed specialists from throughout western Canada.

Plans are underway to develop an interactive web-based version of the seeding manual components, that will allow users to explore and develop their own detailed seeding options (i.e., seed mixtures and seeding rates), applying their own site conditions and circumstances.
